

sailor making the voyage in the fastest time. Nine sailors entered the race and only one — Sir Robin Knox-Johnston — finished, thus claiming both prizes. His voyage spanned 312 days from June 1968 to April 1969. I was pleased to learn from Staff Commodore Pat Rojek that the race is still being held today. For more information on the current race and it's history visit goldengloberace.com. Additionally, the documentary Deep Water recounts the 1968 race with a focus on the least experienced competitor. His log was largely fabricated which led to a premature — and tragic — end to his voyage.

Staff Commodore Jan Badgley recently shared a great film with me about the Race to Alaska. Described as being "like the Iditarod on a boat," the sail begins in Port Townsend, Washington and ends in Ketchikan, Alaska, some 750 miles to the north. The rules are fairly simple: "no motor, no support, all the way to Alaska." This year's event is just around the corner with the starting gun set for June 5. (r2ak.com) The documentary "The Race to Alaska" contains extensive footage of the first race (and some of its more eccentric entries) and is available for rental or purchase on Amazon prime.

Finally, we again want to acknowledge and thank Darrel Vorderstrasse and Jeff Sadler for their extraordinary work in preserving Hiatus by installing a new transmission. It was an honor to recognize their efforts at the last meeting, and we are pleased to report that Hiatus is back in service on its regular schedule.
